New report on economic crime and strengthening partnerships

Perpetuity Research recently released a report, in collaboration with the University of Portsmouth and funded by the Dawes Trust, examining how police forces can more effectively tackle economic crime. The report reveals:

- Economic crime has reached unprecedented levels.
- · Police resources are strained by limited budgets and expanding responsibilities.
- Despite this, law enforcement agencies are not fully leveraging the specialised skills, knowledge, and manpower available in the private and not-for-profit sectors.
- While some joint efforts exist, they are often restricted to basic data sharing, missing opportunities for deeper, more impactful collaboration.
- Significant barriers to collaboration persist, including differing objectives, mistrust, and reluctance to share information due to Data Protection concerns which need to be addressed.

The report calls on law enforcement agencies to strategically engage with external partners, unlocking untapped resources, specialised knowledge, and innovative solutions to better combat economic crime, protect the public, and improve policing outcomes.



Latest Security Thought Leadership Podcasts

We have now released fourteen episodes in our "Security Thought Leadership" podcast series, with each speaker offering unique insights into the security industry and its future. The latest two episodes feature interviews with Professor Sissel Jore from the University of Stavanger, Norway and Professor Joanna Shapland, from the School of Law, University of Sheffield.

Professor Jore

Professor Sissell Jore is a recognised global expert with varied research interests including terrorism, counterterrorism, security risk management, and risk perception. She is the chair of the Security Defence Speciality Group and is an elected board member of the Nordic Society for Risk Analysis. She has made presentations and been a session chair at many international conferences.

In this podcast, she shares her journey into the field of security, detailing the challenges she faced in establishing her identity within a sector that, prior to the 2011 terror attack in Norway, often did not fully recognise the importance of security. She discusses the evolution of security as an academic discipline, explores the distinctions between security and safety, and offers insights from her recent work on security procurement, highlighting why purchasing security services can be particularly challenging.

Professor Shapland

Professor Joanna Shapland is a Professor of Criminology at the University of Sheffield and formerly a Research Fellow at the University of Oxford, where she led the first major study of victims - an area she continues to explore as Executive Editor of the International Review of Victimology. Her pioneering research spans business crime, restorative justice, and desistance. She is currently engaged in research on the offending careers - over 14 years - of persistent offenders. Widely published and globally respected, her achievements earned her the British Society of Criminology's Outstanding Achievement Award in 2013.

In this podcast, she discusses her research on why and how offenders can be encouraged to desist from criminal behaviour, as well as the challenges in preventing persistent offenders from drifting back into crime. She explores the value of restorative justice, examining whether victims truly benefit from meeting offenders and how offenders themselves reflect on these encounters. Additionally, she questions whether a criminal justice system primarily focused on offenders can ever genuinely support victims - and why that issue is so important.

New Research - Investigating Criminality in the Private Rented Sector

Perpetuity Research has been commissioned by Leeds City Council to investigate how residential properties in the private rented sector (PRS) may facilitate criminal activity, particularly organised crime. Funded through the government's Pathfinder programme, the research aims to:

- Deepen the understanding of landlord criminality and its links to organised crime.
- Identify and share best practices while addressing existing barriers.
- Enhance collaboration among housing enforcement agencies within the PRS.
- Develop an online toolkit to reduce property-related crime in the PRS.
- Provide recommendations to the government.


