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New research by Perpetuity - Optimising Police-Security Sector Collaboration

Security Industry Association publishes report on security convergence

The US based Security Industry Association's "Security Convergence 2024" report offers up to date insights into the evolving landscape of security convergence, an area that Perpetuity research in the past and identified similar findings. The Association's report highlights the increasing integration of physical and digital security measures, driven by advancements in technology and the growing complexity of security threats. It underscores the need for security professionals to adapt to this convergence by enhancing their skills and knowledge across multiple domains, including cybersecurity, physical security, and risk management. Moreover, the report emphasises the importance of collaboration between different sectors and stakeholders to effectively address emerging security challenges.

STOP! Think Fraud

The UK government has recently launched a significant campaign to combat fraud, aiming to tackle the increasing threat posed by this type of volume crime. This accounts for around 40% of all crime, with an estimated 3.2 million offences each year affecting 1 in 17 adults in England and Wales. With fraudsters becoming more sophisticated in their tactics, this initiative underscores the government's commitment to protecting citizens and businesses from financial harm as outlined in their recent Fraud Strategy.

The campaign seeks to raise awareness about various types of fraud, educate the public on how to recognise and report suspicious activities, and empower individuals and organisations to safeguard themselves against falling victim to fraudulent schemes. By fostering collaboration between government agencies, law enforcement, and the public, this campaign represents a crucial step in the ongoing fight against fraud in the UK.

Security professionals attend UK OSPAs and Thought Leadership Summit

The eighth UK Outstanding Security Performance Awards (OSPAs) event took place at the Royal Lancaster London on 22nd February 2024. Six hundred security professionals gathered to celebrate the very best from across the sector with dinner and a presentation event hosted by TV host and award-winning critically acclaimed comedian, Zoe Lyons.

OSPAs founder Professor Martin Gill commented "This year, the competition was notably fierce, with a significantly higher number of nominations than in previous years. The task of selecting finalists and winners was no easy feat for the thirty-nine security experts comprising the judging panel. The event stands as a genuine celebration, honouring and acknowledging the outstanding work happening within the security industry. It is dedicated to enhancing the safety and security of our communities, and all those who received nominations should feel a profound sense of pride in their accomplishments." The OSPAs were preceded by a security Thought Leadership Summit (TLS) in the afternoon attended by over 130 security professionals. They heard from a number of speakers on topics including innovation, leadership, and excellence; what buyers of security want; how security is responding to mental health and wellbeing at work; and how to tackle retail security. A panel discussion was held to discuss recruitment into security, and the popular annual 'What the bosses say' session delved into the challenges currently facing the security sector.

Seeing is believing?

The research on Body Worn cameras in public settings including retail environments has been generally positive. However, researchers in Australia have noted that while BWCs are often praised for their potential to combat crime, enhance public safety, and improve accountability, the research indicates that they may inadvertently aid domestic abuse perpetrators in evading accountability.

A national survey conducted by the researchers at the Australian Institute of Criminology (AIC) identified two main concerns regarding the impact of BWC footage in domestic abuse situations. There is a risk of misidentifying the primary aggressor due to the complexities of domestic abuse dynamics. Victims may not fit the stereotype of an "ideal victim" as they may be overwhelmed, unable to articulate their need for help, or reacting physically to abuse. Consequently, footage of their behavior could be misinterpreted and used against them, potentially portraying them as the aggressor instead of the victim. Perpetrators, on the other hand, may manipulate the BWC footage to present themselves as blameless by feigning calmness or innocence when in reality they are the aggressors.

The findings underscore the importance of understanding the nuances of domestic abuse dynamics and the need for insightful interpretation of BWC footage. Simply relying on the footage without considering the context and dynamics of the situation may lead to misjudgements and unintended consequences.

Therefore, there is a call for greater awareness and sensitivity in interpreting evidence from BWCs in domestic abuse cases to ensure that justice is served appropriately.

British Retail Consortium reports surge in violence and abuse against frontline workers

The safety and security of retail staff in the UK is under heightened scrutiny as incidents of violence and abuse against them soared to a staggering 1,300 occurrences per day, reports the British Retail Consortium (BRC) in their recent report. From verbal harassment to physical assaults, frontline workers are increasingly vulnerable to hostile encounters while carrying out their duties. Fifty-three per cent of retailers also reported a climb in online theft, with online fraud increasing over threefold to £99.7 million, from £30 million in the past year.

The report also noted that shoplifters have generally become more violent or threatening in their behaviour towards retail workers and do not appear to care if they injure them in the process of illegally obtaining goods. Some even taunt workers that they cannot do anything to stop them and there have been increasing threats against staff outside stores.

As such, it is imperative for retailers to prioritise the safety and well-being of their employees by implementing robust security protocols, providing adequate training in conflict resolution, and fostering a supportive environment where incidents can be reported and addressed promptly. Collaboration between retailers, law enforcement, and relevant stakeholders is essential to effectively address this concerning trend and ensure the protection of retail workers across the country.

Many UK businesses have cybersecurity 'blind spot'

The Azets Barometer January 2024 survey reveals a concerning gap in the cyber security awareness and reporting of UK businesses, with only 1 in 5 reporting a cyber security incident in the past year despite the escalating global threat landscape. The survey indicates that 74% reported no incidents, potentially indicating a lack of awareness or underestimation of cyber risks. Larger businesses, particularly upper medium-sized ones, showed a higher rate of non-reporting, suggesting a potential false sense of security or underreporting due to investment in preventative measures.

Paul Kelly, UK Head of Cyber Services at Azets, highlights the disconnect between reported incidents and the estimated frequency of cyber-attacks, stressing the importance of cyber security education and investment. Despite this, strategic investment in cyber security remains a top priority for businesses, indicating a growing recognition of the importance of mitigating cyber risks.
